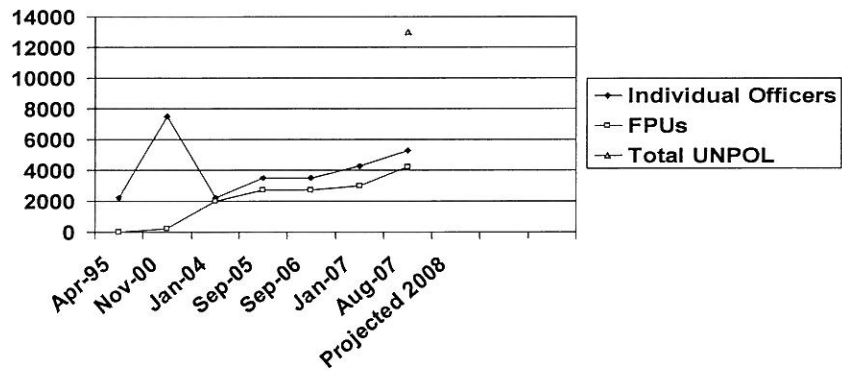


Global Trends

- Human rights and intervention in 1990s
- Responsibility to Protect (2000+ - adopted UN 2005): sovereignty a 'responsibility'
- From peacekeeping to peacebuilding
- Predominant security issues: terrorism, failed states

= increased role for international policing efforts

More Police: UN eg



More roles

■ Move from: (peacekeeping)

- Support
- Monitoring
- Advising
- Reporting
- Training

To: (peace enforcement / peacebuilding)

- Reform, Restructuring, Rebuilding
- Executive roles, inline roles, parallel policing
- Increased use of FPUs

Rise of Police in System

- DPKO changes: now Rule of Law 'pillar' with own ASG
 - Still underresourced / underrepresented
 - Efforts underway to standardise policing
 - Doctrine
 - Training
 - Standards
- + many institutional changes elsewhere too

Issues Arising

- Deployment, composition, standards
- Division of labour with military etc
- Immunities and legal issues
- Matching police to phase of operation
- Sworn / non-sworn roles
- The right move? Appropriate agent for HR / liberal goals (norm dissemination).
